ABA AND NONSPEAKING AUTISTIC PEOPLE

- Nonspeaking autistic people, as well as autistic people with intellectual disabilities, are disproportionately subject to ABA interventions
- Two major uses:
 - Dealing with "challenging behavior"
 - Teaching skills such as use of AAC

AUTONOMY AND SELF DETERMINATION

- Autonomy: Treating a person as their own independent person, a full human being
- Self-determination: The ability to make decisions concerning your own life



COMMUNICATION BILL OF RIGHTS

My Communication Bill of Rights




I have the right to my own friends and social life.

I have the right to say what I feel.




I have the right to make my own, real, choices.

I have the right to be treated with respect.




I have the right to be talked to and not about.




I have the right with be talked with in a way I understand.


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
AUTONOMY






SELF DETERMINATION

ABA IN AAC INSTRUCTION

- PECS: Picture Exchange Communication System
- Withholding desired items until AAC user requests it in desired way using AAC system
- Students start to see AAC as another task they need to comply with and as a demand, rather than as a tool to communicate what they want to say

MODELING AAC

"The average 18-month-old has been exposed to 4,380 hours of oral language at a rate of 8 hours/day from birth. A child who has a communication system (AAC) and receives speech/language therapy 2 times/week for 20-30 minutes will reach the same amount of language exposure (in their AAC language) in 84 years."

HOW TO MODEL

AIDED LANGUAGE STIMULATION


- Speak full sentences, use AAC for key words
- Model only slightly more than the person does independently

IMMERSION METHOD

- Treat AAC as a language
- Use AAC, not your mouth, to talk
- Done with intent to communicate, not just teach

- Regardless of someone's specific support needs, alternatives to ABA exist that can meet those needs
- Being aware of the ways that an intervention enables or prevents self-determination is essential
- Nobody is "too disabled" to deserve human rights
