



How our Interests have been Perceived

- "Highly restricted, fixated interests that are abnormal in intensity or focus" - DSM-5
- Also seen as "obsessions" & "barriers to learning"
- Is this true?





AUTISTIC TRAITS REDEFINED

DEFECIT: Autistics engage in highly restrictive interests with abnormal intensity.

REDEFINED: We are drawn to specific passions that bring us joy, help us self-regulate, foster connections with others, and allow us to process the world around us.

What are Autistic Interests?

- 'Special interests' or 'Spins' often used rather than "hobbies".
- These can last a long time. Some life-long.
- Also known as 'Passionate' or 'Dedicated' interests.
- Not every Autistic person has passionate interests.






Info dumping

- People as interests





Gaming Wellbeing Study

- Autistic Adolescents perspectives on gaming (Claire Usher, May 2022)
- "I have my own space when I'm playing and that's what I like. It's peaceful and calm."
- "I can actually do it without any help or someone watching over me all the time and giving me constant instruction... 'do this, do that'.
 Constant voices. I can just hear myself when I play. It's peaceful and quiet. I know what I'm doing anyway. It's much better."
- "School is hard. I don't know how to do all this stuff but when I play games, I still learn skills but not with all the constant nagging. Its pressure all the time. I can just get a moment of not having that."

'It means the world because I find so much joy in it and I'm so glad I have that.'


